## SPECIAL ELECTION

Legal Proceeding Show-  
ing Boundary and  
Fixing Date

For Vote on the Graded  
School Question

Butler County Court.

1st Day December term, Dec 28, 1901

H. T. Howard et al. Mo. r. v. vote  
Upon upon school question.

On the first day of the November  
term, 1901, of the Butler County

Court the petitioners herein filed their  
petition which is in words and figures  
as follows, to wit:

To the Honorable Judge of the But-  
ler County Court: We, the under-  
signed citizens, vote and residents  
of Morgantown, Butler County, Ky., hereby

more than two legal voters who are  
of common school district No. 30

(White) Butler County, Ky., hereby

petition your honor to make an order  
in your order book at the next regular

term of the Butler County Court  
after receiving this petition, fixing  
the boundary and calling and ordering

a vote to be taken upon the proposi-

tion of whether or not there shall be

established in said boundary as fixed

a graded common school district and

whether or not they will vote an  
annual tax of not exceeding 50 cents on

each one hundred dollars of taxable

and assessed property in said district

belonging to white tax payers and a

poll tax of not exceeding 50 cents each

poll assessed in said district upon

white males over 21 years old for the

purpose of building repairing and fur-

ishing public buildings, houses and

maintaining said graded common

school in said graded common school

district. That the location for said

site of said graded common school be

lots 49, 50, 51 and 52 as shown on

the plot and plan of the town of Mor-

gantown, Ky., being the seminary

square; that the boundary for said dis-

trict be as follows: Beginning at the

mouth of Redfrow creek on Green

river, running thence down the river

with its meanders to Billie V. McIn-

tyre's and John Ayres' corner on

Neil farm, thence a straight line to

the residence of W. T. Ricketts, in-

cluding it and the C. Kelley place,

thence a straight line to Floyd Bau-

nou's, excluding his lot thence a

straight line to the Redfrow bridge

on the poorhouse road adjoining for-

thence down Redfrow to the main

creek, thence down the main creek to

the beginning.

This is all in the

First magisterial district and in-

cludes the town of Morgantown, a

line of the fifth class and all within

the white school district of Butler

county No. 30.

We are citizens and taxpayers resi-

dents in said graded school district.

This is asked under section 161 of

the Kentucky statutes and under § 10

of chapter 110 of said statutes and

we petition your honor to cause the

sheriff to cause a poll to be opened at

the earliest convenient time after this

petition is presented not less than 40

days intervening.
