CITY HALL WHICH WAS WRECKED.

Richest San Franciscans, owns a building seventeen stories high, commonly known as the Call building. One of the older buildings which collapsed was the new postoffice. This was a multi-story structure of granite costing to exceed \$100,000. While not striking from an architectural standpoint, the postoffice was impressive from its size.

The Post office was badly damaged, and the interior room was a wreck. Power to the electrical was destroyed and there were no lights, either gas or electric. SWEDISHMAN

In Santa Rosa Burned Under Debris and Has Narrow Escape.

Oakland, April 20.—C. O. Duffy, of Owensboro, Ky., who has been at Santa Rosa since last October, was the only one of the general score to escape from the floor on which he was quartered at the St. Rose hotel, at Santa Rosa. He tells a thrilling story of the rescue and conditions of affairs at Santa Rosa.

Duffy says that when the shock came he rushed for the stairway, but the building was swaying and shaking and he could make no headway. He threw himself in front of the dresser in the room, trusting that the object would protect him from the falling timbers. This move saved his life. The dresser held the beams which tumbled over him and protected him somewhat from the falling debris.

"I was imprisoned five hours," said Duffy, before I was rescued. Three times I tried to call to the rescuers, who heard me, but could not locate me.

I finally got hold of a lathe and poked it through the hole left by the fallen steampipe, using it and yelling at the same time. I finally managed to show the people where I was.

There were about 300 killed in the destruction of the three hotels and not fewer than 500 in the town. The business section of the place collapsed to the ground inside of five minutes.

Fire started and burned Fourth street from one end to the other, burning imprisoned people. I saw two arms protruding from one part of the debris waving frantically. There was so much noise, however, the screams could not be heard. Just then the flames swept over them and the earthquake. The eight sickened me and I turned away.

WICKEDEST

City in All the World Was San Francisco.

Baltimore, Md., April 21.—Al Herford, the pugnacious promoter, who is known by the sporting fraternity from coast, is perhaps one of the best informed authorities on San Francisco in the city. In speaking to-day of the terrible catastrophe in the metropolis of the Pacific, Mr. Herford said:

"I have been to San Francisco about 14 times, and during my visits I believe little of interest has ever escaped my notice. I think without an exception that Frisco was the most corrupt city in the United States, or as a matter of fact, I might say in the world. It was a veritable Paris, and some of the French restaurants or hotels, as they were called, were conducted along such lines as would even make an old sport like myself blush."

"Those hotels were supposed to be conducted by French people, and the waiters and some of the waitresses were, from all appearances French, as it were. The elite of the city dined in those restaurants. Chinatown was also among the features of the destroyed city. This place was a mecca to civilization. It was one of the most important towns of all Africa, and the way things were conducted in this quarter was outrageous. The police of the city apparently knew and realized what was done, and these heathens were strutting upon the civilized people of the city, yet they made no apparent effort to wipe out the evil."

City of All the World

The New France Will Be According To Plans Already Accepted—Will Equal Paris.

Chicago, April 21.—When San Francisco begins rebuilding Monday it will probably be along plan drawn up September by D. H. Burnham at a cost of \$17,000, and which Mayor Schmidt and his committee pledged themselves to follow as nearly as possible. The fire has swept away all obstacles to the following the plans in detail. The idea is to have a chain of boulevards encircling the entire city, with diagonal streets cut through the business center to relieve the congestion.

The main sketch follows the lines of Paris, Berlin and consists of a number of concentric rings separated by boulevards. The smallest of these rings incircles the civic center of the city. From this center run diagonal arteries in every direction. At each intersection at these arterials with a boulevard there will be a public plaza.

Because of the hills, intermediary boulevards would be impracticable, and for this reason they are replaced by a series of contour roads, circumscribing the hills, connected with each other on the level ground by the main arteries.

The proposed new city is divided into three elements educational, economical, presidential. In the first circle would be all the city and Government buildings; in the second, structures of monumental character, theaters, schools, libraries, churches, museums, &c.; in the outer circles, residences and schools. The water supply will be taken from the Sierras by a system of reservoirs.

FARMERS' MEETINGS.

The American Society of Equity, headquarters, Indianapolis, Ind., will hold meetings in our county.

This Society has for its motto: "Farmers to the Front," for its chief object, "Profitable Prices for all Crops." Its plan is "Controlled Marketing."

It is only three years old, but has members in 2,721 counties, out of a total of about 2,800 in the country suitable for agriculture, and at 26,371 post offices out of a total of 68,181 in the country. Thus it covers the country like a blanket, but it now desires to organize every state solidly and, as it states, "unite the country with steel unions."

Every important industry in the country, and many unimportant ones, except agriculture are now organized. The time has surely come for farmers to unite, so they may exert power they possess, by virtue of their great numbers and the importance of their business.

The plan and chief object of this new society are different from any former farmers' society. Now the farmers grant to merchants and others the right to manage their own business and make their own prices; at the same time they are determined to stick to their own business, so their prices will be as high in proportion as on any goods they buy from others.

All differently, instead of trying to pull other men's business down to a level with their own, the farmers have determined to build their business up to a level with the best of them. In this movement farmers have the good will and co-operation of the merchant, and all the people engaged in legitimate enterprises.

While the A. W. N. is not likely to benefit the farmers, yet it is clear they benefit themselves through profitable prices always and steadily maintained prices, that the movement will benefit every business. It may be stated as an axiom, "Keep the farmers prosperous and everybody prospers." Or the reverse is equally true, "If the farmers take low and unprofitable prices, and every business in the country immediately suffers. We cannot do too much for the farmers.

It is not claimed that farmers are not enjoying a greater degree of prosperity now than ever before, but this society, which is largely responsible for the present condition, seeks to maintain this prosperity and along some lines of the farmers' work, increase it.

It is natural to expect farmers to organize sometimes. The time is probably here now, and every fair person will wish them success in their efforts to take up to take price making of their products out of the hands of a lot of speculators and gamblers, and assume this work themselves. Also, through combining power and co-operation they may secure equity in all business transactions.

The Trial of Neal.

The trial of Estill W. Neal, charged with embezzlement is set for tomorrow in the circuit court. He has been indicted on two charges but even twice as many indictments do not amount to conviction. In the jury room, in which indictments are found, but one shot is heard, and that side uses only black paint; there is no coloring that even borders on whitewash. On the final trial it will be different. The accused will have able attorneys, an intelligent jury of his peers and an able and upright judge.

Against him will be placed prominent persons who will not let a guilty man escape.

The law presumes a man innocent until he is proven guilty. Mr. Neal continues to declare he is innocent. It is to be hoped he is, for the honor of the county and for the sake of himself, his family and his friends. The integrity of the county's judicial institutions have escaped serious tarnishing heretofore, and it is to be hoped that the trial of Mr. Neal will dispel the alleged loss of cash, reconcile the apparent discrepancy of figures in the Stanley bank blotter and establish, beyond question, the right of Mr. Neal to his unfading smile of affirmed innocence. VETERINARY COURSE AT HOME.
